

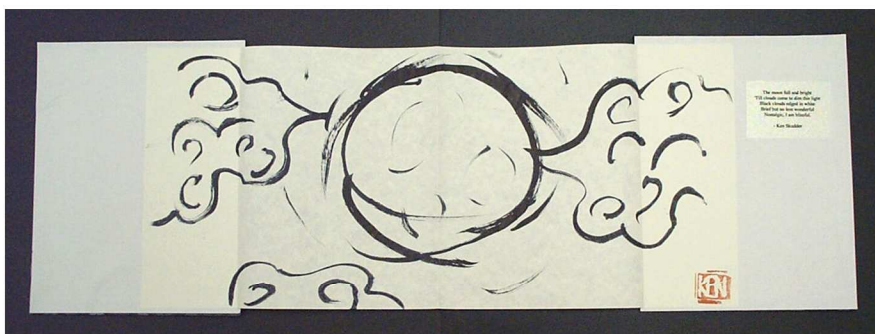
Experiments With Japanese Sumi-e Painting

In Language Arts class, students studied examples of Chinese and Japanese poetry, and had written their own poem in Japanese Tanka form. In Art class, students created Japanese style sumi-e ink paintings to illustrate their poems. These paintings, with their poems, were bound into Japanese style accordian books, that I had worked with the students on in earlier class sessions.

As a first step students studied books on sumi-e paintings and techniques. Then students were given large sheets of newsprint to get the flow of the arm motions and see how the ink flowed on the page. They were encouraged to stand up to gain maximum flexibility and control.
